
The fact that there is **any** field where management skills are worse than that of engineering is a very scary thought.



#### Wanderings Since the Last issue

I finished up at Lockheed Martin Missiles and Fire Control<sup>10</sup> in February of this year. I had been doing pretty much what I had been doing at the end of last year, working with issues on various lightweight artillery rocket launchers

In March, I was back at Raytheon, working for the same division as last time. Most of the division, after having been

savaged by the folks at E-Systems in Garland<sup>11</sup>, had been moved from Richardson, TX to Fort Wayne, Indiana. But a few functions, mostly those that had to deal with Dallas area issues, were moved to the E-Systems site. Interestingly enough, the new site still has the same sepulchral<sup>12</sup> feel to it.

I was responsible for the mechanical design of a satellite

communications terminal, which replaced a piece of 80s vintage electronics with a modern (and about 90% cheaper) commercial off the shelf equipment.

The enclosure (box) that had originally housed the terminal was a complex piece of fabricated and welded aluminum. We replaced it with a casting. This was pretty neat. As a result of technological advances, we could generate prototypes, and production tooling, through a process called stereo lithography, a sort of 3-D printing. We got test models generated in days and tooling generated in only a few days more, directly from the CAD<sup>13</sup> files. Previously, generating a casting took 3-6 months and cost about a hundred thousand dollars for the tooling. Now it's a 4-6 week turn around, with a tooling cost in the low 5 figures.

I finished my work there in September, and in October started work with a company called Varo, again in Garland, TX. They make launch rails for missiles and military power supplies.

My first reaction when I came in was an enthusiastic, "WOW, I've got an OFFICE with a DOOR." I also now have

the title of "Senior Mechanical Engineer", though the title's significance is dubious<sup>14</sup>, as there are no "Junior Mechanical Engineers", or plain "Mechanical Engineers" on site.

I'm working on a power supply for a shipboard vertical launch system. They are sub-contracting to Lockheed Martin in Baltimore, MD, formerly Martin Marietta, and before that Glenn L. Martin Aircraft, known for flying boats like the Mariner and the B-26 Marauder bomber. They still have the ramp to from the

old assembly building the river for launching the planes.

previous record was 58 days.

Over a low to medium heat, add the cottage cheese to the pot and add the American cheese slowly, allowing the first amount to melt into the mixture before adding more cheese. Stir frequently. You should add about 6 slices at a time. If you are using a flavoring cheese, add it last, as it is more prone to scorching than American Cheese.

As an alternative to making the sauce, you can simply add the cheeses to the hot spaghetti and mix it up in the pot, but I think you get better and easier<sup>30</sup> results with the cheese.

When the cheese is done, add the spaghetti to the pot, and stir everything together. Place in an oven preheated at 425° degrees F. for 60 minutes uncovered<sup>31</sup>. Serve plain or with spaghetti sauce.

Notes: You can use about 8 oz Cheddar, Munster, Monterey Jack, or Mozzarella for flavoring. I would avoid using more than that, because these cheeses, particularly Cheddar, have a lot of oil in them. One of these days, I will check out Swiss, which should add an interesting accent. Velveeta® works a bit better than American Cheese, but until Kraft® cheeses get a hechsher³², it doesn't get used in Sharon's¹ Kitchen.

For all the old Stewart and Stevenson folks, Taco Bill was laid off in 1999. The wheels do turn slowly, but they do turn.


There have been troubling developments at our synagogue, Congregation Beth Shalom<sup>36</sup>, a rather eclectic<sup>37</sup> reform Shul.
